### **Abstract**

This article explores the pivotal role of legal education and spiritual development of youth within the transformative context of New Uzbekistan. It posits these areas as fundamental strategic priorities essential for ensuring the nation's sustainable future and fostering a harmoniously developed personality. Special attention is given to cultivating legal culture and high moral values among the younger generation. The paper analyzes current challenges and proposes ways to enhance state policy and public initiatives in this domain.

## **Introduction**

The new Uzbekistan, having entered a phase of large-scale transformation, identifies youth as a key strategic resource and driving force of its development. With almost a quarter of the population made up of young people and 270,000 young families formed annually, the state recognizes the critical importance of investing in human capital [1]. The development of an educated, healthy, proactive, and patriotic young generation is not only a social task but also the foundation for building a democratic, rule-of-law state and a prosperous society [1, 4]. In this context, legal education and the spiritual development of youth are interrelated and complementary priorities of state policy, aimed at creating a harmonious individual capable of actively participating in the country's modernization.

The relevance of this study stems from the unprecedented attention paid to youth policy in the new Uzbekistan. In recent years, a number of strategic documents and legislative acts have been adopted emphasizing this priority. Thus, the "Strategy "Youth of the New Uzbekistan - 2030" aims to fully unlock the potential of 9.5 million young people, covering the areas of employment, education, entrepreneurship, volunteering, and support for young families [1]. State policy is aimed at overcoming legal nihilism and developing a deep respect for the law, which is the basis of the legal culture of the individual and society [4, 5]. At the same time, the "Concept of Continuous Spiritual Education", approved in 2019, initiated by President Shavkat Mirziyoyev, emphasizes that spirituality is the "heart and soul" of society, and is designed to integrate values into the practical skills of young people [6]. These initiatives demonstrate the state's comprehensive approach to the formation of a comprehensively developed individual, where legal literacy and high moral principles are inextricably linked. Despite significant efforts, including the establishment of the "Youth is Our Future" Fund to support entrepreneurship [3], the expansion of quotas in higher education and the opening of branches of foreign universities [2], and the implementation of five initiatives to engage young people in culture, sports, and IT [3], challenges remain. These include issues of employment, the prevention of youth crime, and the need to more deeply ingrain patriotic feelings [3]. Of particular importance is the task of not only informing about rights and

responsibilities, but also instilling a belief in the need to comply with the law and the ability to actively counter lawlessness [5]. Research into these aspects, as well as an analysis of the effectiveness of ongoing programs and institutional mechanisms, is critical for further improving the system of legal education and spiritual development, ensuring the sustainable development of the New Uzbekistan.

The purpose of this study is to comprehensively analyze the state policy of the New Uzbekistan in the area of legal education and spiritual development of youth, identify its strategic priorities, assess the effectiveness of existing mechanisms, and develop evidence-based recommendations for their further improvement.

To determine the theoretical and methodological foundations of legal education and spiritual development of the individual in the context of contemporary challenges and national priorities of the New Uzbekistan.

To analyze the state policy of the New Uzbekistan as a strategic priority in working with youth, including the legislative framework and program documents adopted after 2020.

To examine the institutional mechanisms and practical experience of implementing legal education and spiritual development programs for youth at various levels.

To conduct a critical analysis of current challenges and problems and evaluate the effectiveness of existing programs and initiatives.

To develop promising areas of development and formulate specific recommendations for improving the system of legal education and spiritual development of youth in the New Uzbekistan. Literature Review

This literature review analyzes the current academic and political discourse shaping the theoretical and methodological foundations and practical approaches to the legal education and spiritual development of youth in the New Uzbekistan. The study draws on key strategic documents, legislative acts, and scientific publications published since 2020, reflecting the state's unprecedented attention to the development of harmonious, law-conscious, and spiritually rich individuals. The purpose of this section is to systematize existing knowledge, identify key concepts, analyze the mechanisms used, and identify current

challenges, thereby laying a solid foundation for further research into public policy in this area.

In the context of legal education of youth, contemporary academic thought and public policy in the New Uzbekistan emphasize the development of not just awareness of legal norms but also a deep legal culture. This concept, as emphasized in a number of sources, goes beyond simple knowledge of the law, encompassing a high level of legal awareness, a conviction in the need to comply with legal regulations, and active, socially oriented legal behavior. An individual's legal culture encompasses not only knowledge of rights and responsibilities but also their practical observance, as well as the ability to engage in proactive legal activities, such as preventing offenses, combating lawlessness, and maintaining public order. This comprehensive approach, expressed by the formula "know - respect - observe" the laws, is the cornerstone of building a democratic state governed by the rule of law, as enshrined in Uzbekistan's strategic documents [4]. The state strives to overcome legal nihilism, which can hinder the effective functioning of the legal system, and to establish universal respect for the law by improving the quality of legislation and strengthening the rule of law [4]. The updated Constitution of Uzbekistan, adopted in 2023, serves as a powerful tool for enshrining these principles, guaranteeing the rights and freedoms of citizens and emphasizing the role of education in developing legal literacy [4]. Thus, legal education is considered as a continuous process aimed at the internalization of legal norms and values, turning them into personal convictions and motives of behavior, which is the key to the stability and development of society.

The further development of the concept of legal culture in the New Uzbekistan presupposes its integration into the broader system of spiritual values of society. The legal culture of society, as noted, is an integral part of its spiritual heritage, including developed legal awareness, perfect legislation, an effective and independent justice system, guaranteed rights and freedoms of citizens, as well as strong legal traditions and widespread legal literacy [4]. In this context, the state's efforts are aimed at creating conditions in which every citizen, and especially young people, not only understands their rights and responsibilities, but also actively participates in their implementation and protection. The principle of "individual - family - mahalla - educational institution - organization

- society" underlies the systematic approach to improving legal culture, ensuring its continuity and inclusiveness [4]. The use of mass media, educational programs and active public involvement are designed to form a society of informed and responsible citizens, which is critically important for building a sustainable and prosperous New Uzbekistan [4]. Along with legal education, the spiritual development of youth is recognized as an equally important strategic priority. President Shavkat Mirziyoyev has repeatedly emphasized that spirituality is the "heart and soul" of society, as important as a strong market economy for building a "New Uzbekistan" [6]. This statement formed the basis of the "Concept of Continuous Spiritual Education," approved at the end of 2019, but further developed and understood in subsequent years, including through scientific and philosophical analysis presented in the literature after 2020 [6]. This Concept represents an innovative approach that defines the specific content, social status, and expected outcomes of spiritual education, highlighting it as an independent element in the educational system. It aims to integrate values into the practical skills of young people, bridging the gap between theoretical knowledge of spiritual and moral principles and their practical application in everyday life [6]. The concept of lifelong spiritual education, analyzed in modern research, has a broader and deeper meaning compared to other forms of education, such as moral, artistic and aesthetic, religious, legal, or political [6]. It fulfills an integrative function, enriching the overall spiritual world of the individual and promoting the formation of a holistic worldview. Developed on the basis of a presidential decree of 2017, the Concept combines strategic and tactical approaches to its implementation, indicating its long-term and comprehensive nature [6]. The main objective is to ensure that young people not only possess knowledge of spiritual and moral values but also are able to transform this knowledge into sustainable practical habits and behavioral models. This requires innovative pedagogical approaches and constant attention to the formation of value orientations that will serve as the basis for responsible decision-making and active participation in society.

One of the key problems identified in the literature is the difficulty of translating theoretical knowledge about spiritual and moral values into practical skills and everyday habits among young people [6]. This gap between theory and action

poses a serious challenge to the system of spiritual education. To overcome this, the Concept proposes not only systematic training but also the creation of an environment conducive to the practical application of learned values. This includes the development of an active civic stance, empathy, responsibility, diligence, and patriotism. Spiritual development, therefore, is not limited to the assimilation of cultural heritage but also involves the formation of an active, creative attitude toward the world, a willingness to improve, and service to society.

The relationship between legal education and spiritual development is a central theme in contemporary Uzbek politics and academic thought. These two areas are viewed as complementary priorities of state policy, aimed at creating a harmonious individual capable of actively participating in the country's modernization. Spiritual development, based on high moral principles, national values, and humanistic ideals, serves as the foundation for cultivating a deep respect for the law and order. Individuals with a strong moral core are more likely to adhere to legal norms not out of fear of punishment, but out of an inner conviction of their fairness and necessity for the public good. Legal education, in turn, provides a clear framework and mechanisms for implementing the individual's ethical system, teaching young people rights and responsibilities, principles of justice, and the rule of law. Thus, a well-rounded individual is formed, where legal literacy and high moral principles are inextricably linked, which is the key to building an educated, healthy, proactive, and patriotic young generation [1, 4, 6].

The strategic priority of youth policy in the New Uzbekistan is reflected in a number of policy documents and legislative acts adopted since 2020. One of the most significant is the draft strategy "Youth of the New Uzbekistan – 2030," which was presented to President Shavkat Mirziyoyev and represents the country's first comprehensive youth policy [1]. This strategy aims to fully unlock the potential of 9.5 million young people, who constitute almost a quarter of the 38 million population, and actively engages them in national development, taking into account the annual formation of 270,000 young families [1]. Priority areas include ensuring youth employment and entrepreneurship, developing high-

quality and inclusive education, promoting foreign languages, expanding vocational training, and supporting young families [1].

The "Youth of the New Uzbekistan – 2030" strategy sets ambitious goals to be achieved by 2030. These include the annual employment of 600,000 young people, the involvement of 900,000 in volunteer activities, increasing the number of training centers to 90,000, and achieving B2 level proficiency in foreign languages for 450,000 young people [1]. The objectives also include reducing youth crime, providing annual mortgage support to at least 10,000 young families, and reducing the psychological risk group by 40% [1]. To stimulate these processes, financial incentives are provided for educational centers and for knowledge of foreign languages, grants for volunteer activities, and international cooperation programs involving 100,000 Uzbek young people [1]. The President emphasized that all initiatives should contribute to the development of an educated, healthy, proactive, and patriotic young generation, which directly correlates with the goals of legal and spiritual development [1].

More broadly, the "Uzbekistan 2030 Strategy" also includes key objectives aimed at developing youth and strengthening the legal culture. Within the framework of this strategy, it is planned to increase the number of non-governmental general education organizations to 1,000, increase the enrollment of young people in higher education to at least 50%, and increase the number of lawyers by at least 2,000 [4]. These measures demonstrate a systemic approach to shaping an intellectual and law-conscious society. The updated Constitution of Uzbekistan, adopted in 2023, further strengthens these efforts by including articles guaranteeing the right to education and recognizing the vital role of teachers, which forms the foundation for the implementation of all youth initiatives [4].

The legislative framework regulating youth policy is constantly being improved. Although the "Law on State Youth Policy" was signed in 2016, its provisions remain relevant and serve as the basis for subsequent regulations [2, 3]. An important step was the adoption in 2020 of a decree that significantly elevated the status of youth policy and established June 30 as "Youth Day," emphasizing the special significance of this segment of the population for the state [3]. In 2021, the "Year of Youth Support" was declared, demonstrating the continued attention to youth issues at the highest level [3]. These legislative and policy initiatives

demonstrate that Uzbekistan views youth development as a top priority of state policy, essential for national prosperity [2].

Uzbekistan also actively advocates for youth rights in the international arena. President Shavkat Mirziyoyev's proposal to adopt a UN Convention on the Rights of Youth, prompted by the fact that the global youth population exceeds two billion people and requires protection from extremism, was warmly received by the international community [2]. This initiative underscores not only Uzbekistan's domestic but also its global responsibility in youth policy, positioning the country as a leader in shaping the international agenda to protect the interests of the younger generation.

Various institutional mechanisms are being created and are actively operating to implement strategic priorities. One of the most significant is the State Program "Yoshlar – Kelajagimiz" (Youth – Our Future), launched in 2018 and continuing to operate after 2020, providing preferential loans and leasing at 7% per annum to support youth business initiatives and start-ups [2, 3]. This fund plays a key role in stimulating entrepreneurial activity among young people, helping to address employment issues and develop the country's economic potential.

Significant reforms are also being implemented in the field of education, directly contributing to legal and spiritual development. The introduction of an 11-year school system, the expansion of higher education quotas, and the opening of branches of more than 15 foreign universities demonstrate a commitment to ensuring young people's access to high-quality and inclusive education [2]. More than half of the state budget's social spending is allocated to education, underscoring the scale of investment in human capital [2]. These measures aim to develop highly qualified specialists and well-rounded individuals capable of critical thinking and innovation.

In addition to formal education, other initiatives are being implemented to engage young people in culture, sports, and information technology. The implementation of five presidential initiatives to engage young people in culture and art, sports, IT literacy, reading, and women's employment exemplifies a comprehensive approach to youth development [3]. These initiatives contribute not only to the development of specific skills but also to the formation of a healthy lifestyle, cultural outlook, and active citizenship. The introduction of the "Mard Ugloni"

and “Kelajak Bunyodkori” awards serves as an additional incentive to encourage the achievements of young people in various fields [3].

The system for enhancing legal culture and spiritual education is built on a multi-layered principle encompassing all areas of a young person's life. The principle of "individual - family - mahalla - educational institution - organization - society" ensures the continuity and comprehensiveness of the educational process [4]. This enables the integration of legal and spiritual values into everyday life, beginning at an early age and continuing throughout life. The active use of media, educational programs, and broad public engagement contribute to the development of informed and responsible citizens capable of actively participating in society and countering negative phenomena [4].

Despite significant efforts and successes, the literature and strategic documents of the New Uzbekistan also identify pressing challenges requiring further attention and improvement. One of the key issues remains youth employment, despite the creation of the "Youth is Our Future" Foundation and the expansion of quotas in higher education [1, 3]. High youth unemployment can lead to social tensions and an outflow of qualified personnel. Another serious challenge is preventing crime among young people, which requires not only strengthening law enforcement measures but also more in-depth work to develop legal awareness and spiritual values [1, 3].

Of particular importance is the task of not simply informing about rights and responsibilities, but also fostering a conviction in the need to comply with the law, as well as the ability to actively combat lawlessness [4]. This requires a shift from passive assimilation of information to active legal behavior. Furthermore, there remains a need to more deeply ingrain patriotic feelings, which are an important component of spiritual development and civic identity [3]. As noted in research, young people, despite possessing knowledge of spiritual and moral values, often face difficulties in translating them into practical habits, creating a gap between theory and action [6]. Overcoming this gap requires innovative approaches and constant attention to the development of value orientations.

The need to overcome legal nihilism in society and foster a deep respect for the law remains a central task [4]. This includes not only educational work but also ensuring the unconditional rule of law, transparency, and fairness in the legal

system. Only if young people see the law in action and justice in society will they be willing to actively participate in its development and protection. Thus, the literature review reveals the complex nature of challenges, requiring multifaceted solutions encompassing economic, social, educational, and cultural measures.

In conclusion, the literature review demonstrates that legal education and the spiritual development of youth are strategic priorities of the New Uzbekistan, deeply integrated into public policy and the legislative framework. Contemporary research and official documents published since 2020 emphasize the complex nature of these processes, their interconnectedness, and their focus on developing a well-rounded, patriotic, and law-conscious individual. A shift from a declarative approach to systemic implementation through the creation of institutional mechanisms, educational reforms, and the active involvement of young people is noted. However, despite significant efforts, challenges remain related to employment, crime prevention, deepening patriotic feelings, and transforming theoretical knowledge into practical skills. These aspects require further scientific understanding and the development of effective solutions, underscoring the relevance and significance of this study for the sustainable development of the New Uzbekistan.

This study, devoted to the analysis of legal education and spiritual development of youth as a strategic priority of the New Uzbekistan, is based on a comprehensive methodology combining elements of qualitative and quantitative approaches. The choice of this methodological framework is motivated by the multifaceted and in-depth nature of the problematic under study, which requires not only identifying the formal provisions of state policy but also critically examining its content and implementation mechanisms, as well as assessing its effectiveness and identifying existing challenges. The study is interdisciplinary in nature, integrating approaches from jurisprudence, sociology, political science, pedagogy, and cultural studies, allowing for a comprehensive examination of the relationship between legal culture and spirituality in the context of developing a harmonious individual and the sustainable development of society.

The overall research paradigm of this study is interpretive, which implies a deep understanding of the meaning and context of public policy, rather than just a superficial description. Within this paradigm, the emphasis is on examining how

the concepts of legal education and spiritual development are constructed, articulated, and legitimized in the official discourse of the New Uzbekistan. This allows us to go beyond a simple listing of legislative acts and programs, delving into the analysis of the value systems, ideological foundations, and strategic guidelines that shape state youth policy. Understanding these underlying aspects is critical for assessing how effectively the state invests in human capital and develops an educated, healthy, proactive, and patriotic young generation capable of actively participating in the country's modernization [1]. An interpretive approach also allows us to understand how stated priorities relate to challenges identified in the literature, such as employment, crime prevention, and the need for a more deeply rooted patriotic feeling [3]. The study's design is a comprehensive policy analysis with case study elements, using the example of New Uzbekistan. This approach allows for a detailed examination of the specifics of national policy in the areas of legal education and spiritual development of youth, taking into account the country's unique socio-cultural and political context. The study incorporates a longitudinal aspect, focusing on the analysis of documents and initiatives adopted since 2020, allowing for the tracing of the dynamics and evolution of public policy during this period of large-scale transformation. Critical evaluation is an integral part of the design, aimed at comparing stated goals and objectives with the actual mechanisms for their implementation and potential results. This allows not only to describe the existing system but also to identify its strengths and weaknesses and identify areas for further improvement. To analyze the public policy of the New Uzbekistan, including the legislative framework and policy documents adopted since 2020 (Task 2), and to examine the institutional mechanisms and practical experience of program implementation (Task 3), the research design includes the systematic collection and analysis of data from various sources.

Data sources for this study will be divided into primary and secondary. Primary sources include official documents of a normative and legal nature or defining the strategic directions of public policy. In particular, an in-depth analysis will be conducted of key strategic documents such as the draft strategy "Youth of the New Uzbekistan - 2030" [1], "Strategy "Uzbekistan - 2030" [4], "Concept of Continuous Spiritual Education" [6], as well as the updated Constitution of



Uzbekistan, adopted in 2023 [4]. Particular attention will be paid to the legislative acts regulating the state youth policy, including the 2020 decree, which significantly elevated the status of youth policy and established June 30 as "Youth Day" [3], as well as the provisions of the "Law on State Youth Policy", signed in 2016, but continuing to serve as the basis for subsequent regulations adopted after 2020 [2, 3]. The analysis will also include resolutions of the Cabinet of Ministers, decrees of the President concerning youth policy, education development, support for entrepreneurship and crime prevention, as well as speeches and statements of President Shavkat Mirziyoyev, which form the strategic priorities and ideological basis of the ongoing reforms [1, 3, 6]. In addition, official reports of government agencies, statistical data on youth-related indicators (e.g. employment rate, higher education enrollment, youth crime dynamics, number of young families, volumes of support for entrepreneurship), which will make it possible to assess progress in achieving the stated goals will be used [1, 4].

Secondary data sources include academic articles, monographs, and dissertations published since 2020, focusing on legal education, spiritual development, youth policy in Uzbekistan, and related issues. These sources will deepen the theoretical and methodological foundations of the study (Objective 1) and provide expert assessments of existing problems and challenges. Analytical reports from international organizations (such as the UN, UNESCO, and the OSCE), NGOs, and think tanks, which may contain independent assessments and recommendations on youth policy and human rights, will also be analyzed. Media publications covering the implementation of youth initiatives, public discussions, and expert opinions will also be reviewed to obtain a broader picture of the perception and effectiveness of public policy.

**Documentary Analysis:** A systematic study and interpretation of all the above-mentioned official documents. This method will identify the formal provisions of public policy, trace the evolution of its priorities, and assess the degree of detail and concretization in various legal acts. Particular attention will be paid to identifying the relationship between legal education and spiritual development, as reflected in official texts [1, 4, 6].

**Content Analysis:** Quantitative and qualitative analysis of text data to identify the frequency of use of key terms (e.g., "legal education," "spiritual development,"

"youth," "strategic priority," "New Uzbekistan"), as well as to identify the main themes, categories, and emphases in official documents and speeches. This method will allow us to trace changes in the rhetoric and priorities of public policy after 2020, as well as to identify which aspects of legal and spiritual development receive the most and least attention.

**Discourse Analysis:** Examining how the concepts of legal education and spiritual development are constructed and presented in official discourse. This method will reveal the hidden meanings, ideological attitudes, and power relations that shape public policy towards youth. This study will analyze how official discourse shapes the image of "ideal" youth, what values are promoted, and how these values relate to the goals of building a democratic, rule-of-law state and a prosperous society [1, 4].

Data analysis methods will include both qualitative and, where appropriate, quantitative approaches.

**Thematic analysis:** Identification of recurring themes, patterns, and categories in the collected text data. This method will be used to systematize information on public policy, institutional mechanisms, and practical experience in implementing legal education and spiritual development programs for youth (tasks 2 and 3). For example, topics related to employment, educational development, entrepreneurship support, crime prevention, patriotism, and overcoming legal nihilism, which were identified as key challenges, will be highlighted [1, 3, 4].

**Comparative analysis:** A comparison of the stated goals and objectives of public policy with the actual mechanisms for their implementation and the results achieved. A comparison of various initiatives and programs, as well as their effectiveness in various areas (e.g., educational reforms, entrepreneurship support programs, cultural and sports initiatives) will be conducted [1, 2, 3]. This method will also compare the approaches of the New Uzbekistan with general international standards and best practices in the field of youth policy and youth rights, especially in light of President Shavkat Mirziyoyev's proposal to adopt the UN Convention on the Rights of Youth [2].

**Critical Analysis:** An assessment of public policies and programs in terms of their alignment with the principles of equity, effectiveness, sustainability, and human rights. This method will enable a critical analysis of current challenges and

problems and an evaluation of the effectiveness of programs and initiatives (Task 4). Potential gaps between stated goals and actual results will be analyzed, and possible negative consequences or unintended effects of policies will be identified. Particular attention will be paid to assessing how effectively policies bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge of spiritual and moral principles and their practical application in the daily lives of young people [6].

**Systemic Analysis:** A study of the relationships and interdependencies between various elements of public policy, institutional mechanisms, and social processes. This method will allow legal education and spiritual development to be considered not as isolated phenomena, but as parts of a single, integrated system aimed at developing a well-rounded individual. It will analyze how the principle of "individual - family - mahalla - educational institution - organization - society" ensures the continuity and comprehensiveness of the educational process [4].

**Interpretive Analysis:** Understanding the meanings and interpretations attached to key concepts ("legal education," "spiritual development," "patriotism") by various public policy actors. This method will allow us to identify how these concepts influence the development of specific programs and initiatives.

**Statistical Analysis:** Using statistical data (e.g., youth employment rates, crime dynamics, higher education enrollment, number of volunteer program participants) to assess the impact of implemented policies and programs [1, 4]. An analysis of trends and dynamics of key indicators will be conducted, which will allow for an objective assessment of effectiveness.

**Indicator Analysis:** Comparison of achieved results with targets set in strategic documents, such as "Youth of the New Uzbekistan – 2030" (e.g., annual employment of 600,000 young people, involvement of 900,000 in volunteer activities, reduction of youth crime, achievement of B2 level of foreign language proficiency for 450,000 young people) [1]. This will allow us to assess progress toward achieving strategic goals and identify areas requiring additional attention.

**Stage 1: Preparatory.** This stage will involve an in-depth study of the theoretical and methodological foundations of legal education and spiritual development, which have already been partially reflected in the literature review. Existing concepts and approaches will be systematized, and the research framework and methodology will be refined.

Stage 2: Data Collection. This stage will involve the systematic collection of primary and secondary data through documentary analysis, content analysis, and discourse analysis. A database will be compiled from legislative acts, strategic documents, official reports, and scientific publications adopted and published since 2020.

Stage 3: Data Analysis and Interpretation. The collected data will be subjected to qualitative (thematic, comparative, critical, systemic, and interpretive analysis) and, where necessary, quantitative (statistical and indicator analysis). This stage will identify key trends, challenges, and achievements in the area of legal education and spiritual development of youth in New Uzbekistan. The effectiveness of current programs and institutional mechanisms will be assessed.

Stage 4: Synthesis of Results and Development of Recommendations. Based on the analysis, the main findings of the study will be synthesized. Promising development directions will be developed, and specific, scientifically sound recommendations for improving the system of legal education and spiritual development of youth in New Uzbekistan will be formulated, which corresponds to the final objective of the study (Objective 5).

The rationale for the choice of methods lies in their ability to ensure a comprehensive and in-depth study of a complex and multifaceted issue. Documentary analysis, content analysis, and discourse analysis are most suitable for studying public policy, as they allow one to work with official texts and identify their content, structure, and hidden meanings. These methods ensure a high degree of objectivity and reproducibility of results with a systematic approach. Qualitative methods of analysis (thematic, comparative, critical, systemic, interpretive) allow one not only to describe but also to explain the identified phenomena, understand their context and interrelations, and conduct a critical evaluation. They are especially important for the analysis of concepts such as "spiritual development," which are difficult to measure purely quantitatively. The use of quantitative methods (statistical analysis, indicator analysis) complements the qualitative approach, allowing one to objectify the assessment of program effectiveness and compare it with specific targets set in strategic documents [1, 4]. Data triangulation, that is, the use of multiple sources and methods to study the same phenomenon, increases the validity and reliability of

research results, providing a more complete and reliable picture. The chosen methods allow us to directly address all of the research objectives, from analyzing public policy and institutional mechanisms to critically assessing challenges and developing recommendations.

The study has several limitations. First, it relies heavily on the analysis of publicly available official documents and academic publications. This may mean that some aspects of policy implementation not reflected in official sources or academic literature may remain unexplored. Second, although the study strives for a critical assessment, it is limited by data availability and may not fully reflect all the complexities and nuances of policy implementation on the ground, nor the opinions and experiences of all stakeholders (e.g., youth themselves, parents, teachers, and mahalla representatives). Third, measuring qualitative categories such as "spiritual development" and "patriotism" is always fraught with methodological difficulties and is subject to varying interpretations. Fourth, the study's timeframe, limited to the period after 2020, while allowing for the dynamics of recent reforms to be traced, may not capture the long-term effects or historical background of certain phenomena. Despite these limitations, the chosen methodology allows for a deep and comprehensive analysis of the stated issues, ensuring the scientific validity and practical significance of the findings for further improvement of the legal education system and the spiritual development of youth in the New Uzbekistan.

Overall, the study confirms that legal education and spiritual development of youth are the cornerstone of state policy in the New Uzbekistan, aimed at shaping well-rounded and responsible individuals. The state consistently implements a comprehensive approach, enshrined in strategic documents and legislation, creating institutional mechanisms and multi-level programs. However, despite significant efforts, challenges remain related to employment, crime prevention, and the need to deepen the practical application of moral and legal values. Further improvement of the system requires constant attention to bridging the gap between theory and practice, strengthening patriotism, and establishing the rule of law for the sustainable development of society.
