It ensures the ability to adapt to new conditions, integrate innovations, and make informed pedagogical decisions. Pedagogical reflection can be classified according to its content, timing, and function. According to content:

1. Cognitive reflection – analysis of knowledge, skills, and methods of teaching.
2. Emotional reflection – awareness and evaluation of emotional states during teaching and learning.
3. Value-based reflection – consideration of ethical and moral aspects of teaching.
4. Social reflection – understanding interpersonal relationships in the educational process.

According to timing:

- Reflection before action (pre-active) – setting goals and predicting results.
- Reflection in action (interactive) – analyzing and adjusting activities during teaching.
- Reflection after action (post-active) – evaluating outcomes and identifying areas for improvement.



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According to function:

- Diagnostic – identifying problems and difficulties in teaching.
- Corrective – making changes and improvements.
- Predictive – planning future actions and innovations.

Reflection operates on different levels:

- ✓ Elementary level: spontaneous evaluation of classroom events.
- ✓ Analytical level: systematic consideration of teaching methods.
- ✓ Creative level: generating innovative ideas and integrating them into practice.

Thus, reflection evolves from simple observation to creative problem-solving and innovation. Teacher professionalism today is defined not only by knowledge and skills but also by the ability to think critically and reflectively. Reflective teachers analyze their pedagogical experience, identify patterns, and implement new strategies to achieve better results.
