However, attaching a smiling emoji can transform interpretation, signal heat and desire to get involved more. Consequently, emojis not only increase clarity, but also promote a more empathic and understanding digital environment.

Moreover, the role of the cultural context in the interpretation of emojis cannot be exaggerated. Sun et al. (2023) highlight that the meaning of specific emojis can vary widely between different cultural origins. What can be perceived as a positive or cheerful symbol in one culture can evoke completely different emotions in another one. For example, the emoji of thumb is usually seen as a symbol of approval in western cultures, while in certain Middle East cultures, can be considered offensive. Such disparities require an understanding of the cultural context to completely understand the intended emotional transport of emojis. This cultural variability emphasizes the complexity of emojis as communicative tools; They are not universal identifiers of emotion, but contextually contingent symbols whose meaning is influenced by individual origins and social norms.

In addition, the interpretation of emojis also depends strongly on the context in which they are implemented. For example, the same emoji can convey different feelings, depending on the surrounding text and relational dynamics between the



interlocutors. In a professional exchange, a blink emoji can indicate a playful mood or intention, while in a personal conversation; this can mean flirting or sarcasm. Such contextual factors can improve emotional understanding among participants or lead to additional failures if emotional tonal clues are not properly aligned with the intention of the message.

In addition, the incorporation of emojis specific to the region, such as those which reflect local traditions, celebrations or common practices, indicate an increasing recognition of cultural diversity in digital interactions.
